

Solihull SSCP Multi-Agency Training Report 2022/23

Attendance Analysis

Between April 2022 and March 2023, 691 practitioners and members of staff completed SSCP multi-agency training. As demonstrated in Figure 1 below, this number of delegates trained has increased by 45% on last year's figure. This figure also exceeds our pre-COVID figures. Partners had completed a three-year training needs assessment for 2022-2005 and had forecast that they would need 5994 people trained in 2022-23. Their forecast was extremely high in comparison to previous engagement in multi-agency training and enormously overestimated the number of people that could actually be released from their role to attend training in the year.



In addition to Modular training courses, the SSCP also held three launch events the Right Help, Right Time, Right Response launch (113 attendees) and the launch of the multi-agency Child Sexual Abuse Procedures (45 attendees). If we were to combine numbers trained in 2022/23 with the number of attendees at SSCP launch events our total would reach 849 practitioners. In terms of attendance by agency, Figure 2 below demonstrates the breakdown of agency attendance. Again, Schools and Colleges make up over half of all delegates attending training.



Module Analysis

Using data from the online training portal, the SSCP can demonstrate and capture the impact of training on practitioners and practice through pre- and post-course evaluation forms.

The post course written evaluations, completed 3 months after training, can be particularly insightful, they are made up of answers to four questions which ask delegates for examples of how the training has impacted them and their teams, knowledge, practice, and outcomes for children they work with. The responses for each module have been summarised below as they help to demonstrate the impact of training with depth and specific detail.

Included under each module sub-heading is also graph. This indicates the rating out of ten each delegate gave before the course for their knowledge, skills, and confidence of/on the content of a module (labelled as 'Stage 1') and after the module (labelled as 'Stage 3'). This data allows the SSCP to quantifiably demonstrate its impact by averaging delegate scores at each stage.

Where there are more pre-course forms completed than attendees, this would be due to delegates cancelling prior to or not attending training on the day. It should also be noted that post course evaluations on each course overall are low however for a number of courses, the 3-month post course evaluation forms have not yet been sent out and therefore not all courses are able to provide post course feedback at this time.

Managing Allegations Against Staff (MAAS)

It is for those with supervisory responsibilities for staff undertaking safeguarding work; managers and strategic leads in multi-agency organisations. This workshop provides an essential grounding for managers to enable them to manage allegations of abuse against staff who:

- Have, or may have harmed a child
- Have, or may have committed a criminal offence against or related to a child/ren
- Have behaved towards child/children in a way that indicates s/he is unsuitable to work with children

The table above demonstrated the increase in knowledge, skills and confidence reported by both delegates and their managers since attending the MAAS course. The evaluations from delegates were very positive with some noting that they have gone on to update their own agencies policies to reflect what they had learnt from the training. Other delegates noted they now have a greater understanding of the role of the LADO.

From a participant; "I was able to use this training when going through the Managing Allegations Policy with staff and felt more confident in answering questions"

From a manager; "The member of staff has provided support us to consider how we manage low level concerns informed by this training"

Module 1 – Early Help

Module 1 is a half-day course designed for those who identify additional needs and carry out early help assessments. The course provides delegates with the knowledge to apply Solihull local thresholds, to respond appropriately to concerns about children with additional needs by effectively interacting with partner professionals and to carry out early help assessments.



On average, delegates knowledge, skills and confidence of early help has increased by at least 43% as a result of attending this training module. In the post course evaluations, delegates reported that this module has encouraged them to become more vigilant and professionally curious. A number of delegates reported that this module has provided them with the knowledge and confidence to speak more openly with families and highlighted the importance of record keeping. Delegates report this module has increased their understanding of Solihull thresholds as well as providing them with the knowledge to develop their own single agency guidance around early help.

From a participant; "Following a severe family illness I communicated with relevant parties to secure support for the child, remove as much stress as possible and keep their routine and stability where possible."

From a manager; "They have demonstrated a better understanding of where support from Early help & assessment is beneficial- looking at support for emerging needs and who might benefit from this to prevent further escalation of concerns"

Module 1b Early Help - Recognising and supporting parents in parental conflict

This course explores an individual's role as a front-line practitioner when identifying and discussing parental conflict with parents. This course allows practitioners to recognise the differences between destructive and constructive conflict and the impact this has on child outcomes as well as giving practitioner's confidence in practice when working with parents in conflict situations.



The table about demonstrates a clear increase in knowledge, skills, and confidence as a result of professionals attending this module. Delegates noted that this module has made them more aware of the impact of parental conflict on the child's daily life. In addition, delegates reported that the module has encouraged a change in their vocabulary from 'what's wrong' to 'what's happened' as well as showing the importance of asking open ended questions. The knowledge and skills provided in this module has helped delegates to recognised the early signs of coercion and control as well as the importance of including both parents in communication where appropriate.

From a participant "I have been involved with a family in a matter of days from this course. It has made a significant difference to the child, so much that initial speculation was about possible SEN, but they have now made such progress that this is no longer a concern."

From a manager; "they have improved confidence in dealing with parents and increased ability to look for triggers."

Module 2 - Child Protection: An introduction to multi-agency working

Module 2 remains SSCP's most popular course. This module is aimed at those who identify child protection concerns and make child protection referrals. It enhances competence around sound, evidence informed communications and making child protection referrals; contributing to child protection conferences and core groups; identifying and challenging drift and delay (with specific reference to the complexities of the child's experience when living with domestic violence, substance misuse and/or parental mental health problems) and using escalation procedures.



Delegates noted an increase in their confidence as a result of attending module 2, this is reflected in the table above. The increased confidence was often in relation to a better understanding of the threshold document as well as being more confident to be part of multi-agency working and be more assertive when talking to other agencies. A number of delegates reported that this module stressed the importance of capturing the voice of the child in all cases and ensuring the child is at the centre of all assessments and plans.

From a participant; "this course helped me to secure services for a child who was suffering neglect."

From a manager; "there was a specific case where this worker was able to challenge and engage with the social worker better from understanding the process."

Module 3 - Child Protection: The challenges of multi-agency working

This module is aimed at those who also regularly attend child protection conferences and core groups and/or supervise or manage those who do, or lead organisations that do. It addresses common concerns that arise from multi-agency working. It covers how to deal with conflict when it occurs, in a respectful and effective manner by using the SSCP's escalation procedure. The module also highlights the importance of ensuring all partners are engaged in order for them to work together to effectively safeguard children.



One manager reported that their staff member has become more confident since attending this module, as a result they have been able to spot concerns early, make referrals at the right time and significantly improve a child's life. It was identified by a number of professionals that discussions around the SSCP's escalation procedures has been very helpful.

from a participant; "I have been able to communicate with other agencies after making a referral and the outcome has been that a child's life has significantly improved since."

From a manager; "the participant is more confident to speak to outside agencies and understands the process more in depth."

Module 5 – All Age Exploitation Awareness

Module 5a is aimed at those who work with children, young people and adults who are responsible to identify and respond to exploitation. The course will equip delegates with the knowledge and skills to know what exploitation is, how to recognise is and how to respond and report exploitation concerns. This module introduces the trauma experienced by those who are victims of exploitation.

The pre and post evaluation scores suggest that professional's knowledge, skills and confidence has increased by at least 62%. Delegated reported that they have more knowledge and skills around identifying exploitation and that this has enabled them to advise their colleagues around exploitation.

From a participant; "This training has enabled a better response to exploitation concerns. Understanding of what happens once a concern has been raised."

From a manager; "the participant has been able to steer and guide their team with cases involving children and young people."

Module 5.1 - An Introduction to Contextual Safeguarding

This module is aimed at those who work directly with vulnerable children and young people in relation to child exploitation. The module helps professionals to develop an understanding and explore ways of responding to young people's experiences of significant harm beyond their families.



Delegates reported that this training has improved their service as practitioners are now encouraged to always consider the wider network around the child. A number of delegates have noted that they have recommended this training to their colleagues.

From a participant; "I have ha the confidence to explore young people's concerns and refer to relevant organisations."



From a manager; "This has given the participant the impetus to ask those further searching questions and the confidence to make referrals and ask for further information from partners or the exploitation team."

Module 5.2 - Parents as partners in tackling Child Exploitation (CE): Working with a supporting parents affected by CE

This course aims to look at the impact of Child Exploitation (CE) on the family and explore effective methods of working with and supporting parents and carers affected by CE to help safeguard the child or young person. This module raises the need for understanding traumatic impacts of exploitation on all family members- considers secondary trauma for parents', the impact of grooming, and the importance of relational practice.



Only one post evaluation form was completed for this course. This delegate noted that the course has encouraged them to listen to the whole story when working with families which has in turn improved their response to children, young people and families.

From a participant; "I have learnt to listen to the whole story, what is the impact on all of the family, not just those directly involved."

Module 6 – Neglect: Impact on child development

This module enables practitioners to use national research and practice experience to help them understand the impact of neglect on a child's development, using evidence informed assessment tools and contributions from partner agencies to inform assessments. This module received a quality assurance monitoring from the chair of the neglect subgroup this year.



Feedback on this module has been very positive, delegates have noted that this module is very thought provoking and demonstrated the importance of taking greater consideration of people's life experiences when considering if there is neglect what someone's idea of basic need and the definition of basic needs can be different. Delegates have reported that this module has made them more vigilant. In addition, the consideration of a child's developmental stages and how that links to spotting neglect was greatly received by several delegates.

From a participant; "We had a session with young people about neglect using the information from this course; running interactive activities."

From a manager; "The participant is more aware of cases where neglect is suspected; better able to make assessments & referrals."

Module 6b - Neglect: Domestic Abuse

This module is focuses on the signs of domestic abuse, including coercive and controlling behaviour. Further to this, the course explores some of the many barriers faced by victims of domestic violence. Finally, the impacts of these behaviours on the child are considered and safety plans and assessments are discussed. This module considers coercion and control and trauma bonding. This module received a quality assurance monitoring from the chair of the neglect subgroup this year.



This module has allowed practitioners to gain a better understanding of how to spot signs of domestic abuse, understand the impact this has on the child and also a greater understanding of the different screening tools available to professionals. All delegates on this module reported that they now feel more confident and have the necessary skills to respond to concerns of domestic abuse.

From a participant; "I am working with a family fleeing domestic abuse, I am able to support Mum and the child with more knowledge of their experiences".

From a manager; "The participant is keen but inexperienced and would raise concerns frequently via channels that were not always correct, as a result of the training they are able to evaluate the situation fully with a more informed and balanced approach and raise concerns correctly."

Module 6c – Neglect: The Graded Care Profile 2

The Graded Care Profile 2 (GCP2) is a tool designed to provide an objective measure of the care a parent provides to their child/ren. The course is aimed at those who identify and assess early help and child protection concerns and follow a multi-agency approach and/or regularly attend and report to child protection conferences and core groups and/or supervise or manage those who do. The course enables practitioners to understand and confidently use the Graded Care Profile 2 to inform their assessments.



Some delegates have used the post course evaluation form to demonstrate examples of where they have used GCP2, one example included using GCP2 to work with a lone parent who was lacking confidence in their parenting ability. The practitioner was able to use GCP2 to identify strengths with the parent as well as identifying some areas that they may need additional support which has benefitted both the parent and child. Many professionals who have undertaken this training have recommended it to their colleagues.

From a participant; "We have used GCP2 to support a parent who has very little confidence in her parenting skills. It helped her to understand where her skills are and where they need more work and put a plan into place. It has helped her confidence and as a consequence helped her child."

From a manager; "the participant was involved with GCP2 being led by another agency at the time. The course helped to understand the tool and contribute to its use at the time."

Module 7 - Physical Abuse: Impact on child development

By completing this module attendees should be able to spot signs of physical abuse and understand its impact on a child's development. Further to this, they should be able to effectively use evidence informed assessment tools and use contributions from partner agencies to inform assessment.



Delegates noted that this course has made them more aware of the signs to look out for when noticing potential non-accidental bruising. Delegates now feel they have the knowledge and confidence to be more professionally curious, it has also helped them to ensure they are passing on the right information to other agencies and to MASH.

From a participant; "This course led to identifying an injury that ended up being inflicted by parents that maybe would not have been questioned as defensive wounds before."

From a manager; "the participant has been able to communicate with clarity to parents carers and other professionals their concerns"

Module 8 - Emotional Abuse: Impact on child development

This module will help professionals to spot signs of emotional abuse and understand its impact on a child's development. Further to this, module 8 will help professionals when carrying out or contributing to thorough assessments where emotional abuse is suspected.



The increase in knowledge, skills and confidence is demonstrated in the table above. Delegates felt that the course has given them the tools and knowledge to support families and signpost them to extra support if needed. Delegates have a refreshed understanding of thresholds now feel confident in helping their colleagues who may be supporting families with emotional abuse concerns. One delegated reported that the national research used by the SSCP Training Officer was very interesting.

From a participant; "A child often comes asking to speak to me as a trusted adult knowing that I understand what has happened in the family home."

From a manager; "the participants understanding of emotional abuse is helping them to support a child on a daily basis."

Module 9 - Sexual Abuse: Impact on child development

This module will help professionals to spot signs of sexual abuse and understand its impact on a child's development. Further to this, the module will also look at how professionals can effectively use evidence informed assessment tools and use contributions from partner agencies to inform assessments.



Delegates reported feeling highly confident and able to offer peer support following this training. One delegate noted they are now more aware of behaviours which could indicate that a child is at harm, as a result they have feel more confident to ask questions and have more professional curiosity. Another delegate noted that the knowledge gained through the training has enabled them to look at some of the young people they work with and has in turn provoked referrals to MASH which are more specific and informative.

From a participant; "The toolkit has supported a referral to MASH when it was difficult to really pinpoint the problem based on a range of specific behaviours presented by the child."

From a manager; "the participant has more awareness of the signs to look out for an more awareness of the resources available (toolkit)."



<u>Virtual Training – An Introduction to safeguarding for Voluntary & Community Sector Organisations</u>

This course is aimed at those who work or volunteer in voluntary and community sector not for profit organisations for children, young people, and families.

The course offers the following learning outcomes:

- Understand what is meant by safeguarding and child abuse
- Describe different types, signs and indicators of abuse and neglect
- Understand how to respond to concerns about safety and welfare of children and know who to report to
- Understand what the process is for reporting your concerns and recording your observations



The feedback on this course was highly positive from professionals across a range of third section agencies. Delegates felt the course has enable them to become more observant of childrens behaviours and aware of potential risks. In addition, delegates felt that this course had given them greater confidence when dealing with disclosures and also enabled the to become more confident in their agencies safegarding approach.

From a participant "When a child complained if feeling really hungry for two mornings, I checked whether they had had breakfast; On multiple occasions children have grazes, but I check how they have happened an dthat they hav ereceived the appropriate care."

From the manager; "the participant is confident & looking out for signs; they are not afraid to report their concerns."

Missing - Welfare Return Interviews



This course is aimed at those who may carry out welfare return interviews for children and young people missing from home, care and other settings; this could be those employed to do this role, or those who children/young people nominate to do their interview.




The figure below shows the breakdown by agency of attendees at the right help, right time, right response launch events.

SSCP Multi-Agency Training Pool

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SSCP multi-agency training needs assessment 2023-24.

Module 6e & 6f are co-delivered with BSMHF and were withdrawn due to high service demand on their workforce; this is under review, with a commitment to support delivery when conditions allow.

Module 6,4 has now been commissioned, with those attending required to complete Module 6b first to ensure they have a good understanding of coercion & control. Module 5.3 is also now included in the multi-agency training offer.

Organisations were also asked to identify any further multi-agency training they feel should be provided, when and in what format this would be required. Only one agency made a request; this was for clarification around SEND processes and this is currently in development.
